Dear Riggs' Families,

Our third quarter is soon coming to an end which also means that Spring Intersession is just around the corner!! I hope that the time off will revitalize and invigorate our students so they will be prepared and ready for a very busy and productive fourth quarter. Before break, I would also like to send an immense thank you to everyone, including our Riggs PTO for your efforts in making this years Boosterthon such an enormous success. As mentioned at our last PTO meeting, we surpassed our goal and made over \$30,000 profit. March and April also signifies the start of the "testing season" in Arizona. Students and staff will continue to gear up for the administration of the state wide AZMERIT test that will take place at Riggs during the month of April. Our students will again take the test online using the COWS that have been provided by our PTO and school district. Fourth grade students will also be administered the AIMS Science assessment. It is imperative that every student is in attendance during their testing days and that each Riggs Roadrunner gives their best effort while taking these standardized tests.

Here are several things that you as a parent can do to help your child be successful with these tests.

- 1) Send your child to school every day (attendance is part of the criteria the state uses to determine adequate yearly progress). Students also need to arrive to school on time as well! **Teachers can't teach students who aren't in school.**
- 2) See that your child gets plenty of sleep each school night. Most students need at least eight hours of sleep every night.
- 3) See that your child eats a nutritional breakfast. Even toast and a piece of fruit will provide the brain and body energy.
- 4) Encourage your child to exercise every day. Exercise increases oxygen to the brain and helps with thinking and memory. Educational research tells us that these factors will help ensure that your child does his/her very best.

Thank you for your efforts to help your children become the best that they can be, and thank you for your continuing support and assistance to make Riggs the best that it can be. Whatever your plans are for the upcoming intersession, if you are traveling or staying local, my hope is that it is an enjoyable and memorable time for your entire family.

### **HEALTH OFFICE HAPPENINGS...**

Upcoming 5<sup>th</sup>/6<sup>th</sup> Grade Students New Kindergarten Students

Please Read!!!!

Upcoming 5<sup>th</sup>/6<sup>sh</sup> graders that are <u>11 years old</u> must have all of the required immunizations, Tdap and Meningococcal (Menactra), which

are Arizona State requirements. These must be received before the 2019-2020 school year starts. Students entering 5<sup>th</sup>/6<sup>th</sup> grade that are already 11 years old at the start of school will not be allowed to start the school year unless an updated shot record is in the health office by the start of the 2019-2020 school year.

Students entering Kindergarten will also need to be up to date on all immunizations prior to the first day of school on July 23, 2019. So please schedule those appointments now as summer will be over before you know it. Kindergarten students will not be allowed to start the school year unless they have their updated shots and an updated shot record in the health office by 7/23/19.

If you have signed an Exemption Form for religious beliefs (PRE K), an updated WAIVER form will be required. The waiver can be found on the Arizona Department of Health Website and will need to be printed, completed and then brought into the health office. The health office is no longer able to provide a copy of the waiver for you to complete.

If anyone has large youth or adult size flip flops they Preschool—We have so many fun things planned in preschool during this spring season! We will explore the life cycle of plants and take a closer look at nature all around us. We will be able to observe the plant life cycle first hand by planting



seeds of our own and watching them grow! We will also be using lots of fun things to work on comparing numbers 1-10. After break we will get to investigate different kinds of weather!

Kindergarten—"You can find magic wherever you look. Sit back and relax, all you need is a book."~Dr. Seuss

This month we are concluding our Dr.
Seuss author study. It has been so much fun digging deeper into Dr. Seuss' engaging books and bringing them to life in our classrooms. As we head into spring break, please continue reading stories each night with your child. Additionally, have your child keep a journal of their experiences. Students should draw a detailed picture and write a complete sentence about their picture with correct conventions (punctuation, capitals, spacing, and penmanship).



**First Grade**—Third quarter is coming to an end quickly. Math this quarter involved measuring using non-standard units, telling time and two- and three- dimensional shapes. We will be really focusing on the properties of three dimensional shapes and fractions in

March. Our 1st graders continue to amaze us with their reading growth. Reading groups continue and the kids are working with long vowels, suffixes and their meaning, ABC order, and classifying. For social studies, we are enjoying our student experts teaching the class about various topics. We, also, will be learning some interesting facts about Ancient Egypt. In science, we look forward to learning all about the life cycle of a butterfly while watching our butterflies emerge.



Second Grade—Our Phoenix Zoo field trip gives us hands-on experience looking at animal adaptations, as we spend more time

in reading non-fiction books. Our writing expectations continue to challenge students to write descriptive sentences, look at verb agreement, commas, adjectives, informational texts, and paragraphs. In math we are learning to create graphs, & will move on to telling time. These last few months of 2<sup>nd</sup> grade will be memorable!

**Third Grade**—Wow 3<sup>rd</sup> grade is wrapping up third quarter! They've worked so hard. Students continue to enjoy many math and science STEM activities in class and making huge growth using technology. Also, please continue a healthy balance of technology at home



by completing ATI homework and using educational apps to practice math facts and typing skills. This boost students' confidence at home and school. Finally, Third Graders will finish publishing their first book. Those will be sent off to the publishing company. We look forward to receiving their published books this spring. Way to go 3<sup>rd</sup> Grade!!

Fifth Graders are springing into action this quarter. We have worked hard over the past three quarters to prepare for the AZ Merit and are eager to show off what we know! We will be setting testing goals in class. Please have a

testing goals in class. Please have a conversation about these at home. A fun and exciting month is awaiting us. We will begin a solar system unit in Science, a new literature study in Reading, studying westward expansion in Social Studies, working on geometry in Math, and also working on amazing STEM activities as well.



Fourth Graders finished our literature study on the Black Stallion with our annual Kentucky Derby Day Hat Contest! It was awesome to see all of the amazing hat creations! We will also wrap up our science unit on animals and plants. We continue to become experts with

Informational Text and are learning several new strategies/ skills in reading and math. When we return from spring break, it'll be full-speed ahead to review for the AIMS science and AZMERIT tests. Students will get to participate in a fun AIMS Boot camp as well as other review activities. We know that the students will all do their very best and we are so proud of all they have accomplished this year!



**Sixth Grade**—In March, sixth graders we will continue the process of preparing for AZ Merit Testing. To help your student prepare for this year's test we will begin by helping them become familiar with the test format and termi-

nology. They will learn/review test-taking strategies (when to guess, when not to), to become comfortable with time restrictions, and to practice answering different types of questions. Also, Mrs. Oerter will be meeting with each student to discuss last year's results and set goals for this year's testing. Our goal for all students is that they score high and show adequate growth.
