

Networking Essentials v1.0 Scope and Sequence

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Target Audience

The Cisco® Networking Essentials curriculum is designed for high school, college, and Cisco Networking Academy® students that are interested in completing an introductory networking course.

Prerequisites

For proper skill building, the students should be have a basic understanding of how to use a computer and browse the Internet.

Target Certifications

There are no target certifications for this course.

Curriculum Description

This course teaches the fundamentals of networking. It covers how devices communicate on a network, network addressing and network services, how to build a home network and configure basic security, the basics of configuring Cisco devices, and testing and troubleshooting network problems. The course has many features to help students understand these concepts:

- Rich multimedia content, including interactive activities, videos, games, and quizzes, addressing a variety
 of learning styles to help stimulate learning and increase knowledge retention.
- Hands-on labs and Packet Tracer simulation-based learning activities to help students develop critical thinking abilities and complex problem solving skills.
- Innovative assessments provide immediate feedback to support the evaluation of knowledge and acquired skills.
- Technical concepts are explained using language that works well for learners at an introductory level, and embedded interactive activities break up reading of the content and reinforce understanding.
- The curriculum encourages students to consider additional IT education, but also emphasizes applied skills and hands-on experience.
- Cisco Packet Tracer activities are designed for use with Packet Tracer 6.3 or later.

Curriculum Objectives

The goal of this course is to introduce the student to networking, network service and device configuration, and Cisco routers and switches. The online course materials will assist the student in communicating their knowledge and desire to learn more about networking and pursue a networking career.

- · Explain the requirements for network connectivity.

- · Build a small network using an integrated network router.
- · Explain the importance of IP addressing.
- Explain how the protocols of the TCP/IP suite enable network communication.
- · Configure an integrated wireless router and wireless clients to connect securely to the Internet.
- · Configure basic network security.
- Build a simple computer network using Cisco devices.
- Troubleshoot common network issues found in home and small business networks.

Minimum System Requirements

For the best learning experience, we recommend a class size of 12 to 15 students and a ratio of one Lab PC per student. At most, two students can share one Lab PC for the hands-on labs. Some lab activities require the student Lab PCs to be connected to a local network.
