Assessments and Assignments

Students will complete assessments during each unit of study to assess their understanding. Students will complete the CUSD Common Final at the end of the first and second semesters. The Common Final will count for 20% of the student's final semester grade in grades 9-12. Common finals will be in ELA, Math, Science, Social Science, and World Language.

Final exams will be given during the CUSD Jr High/High School Early Dismissal days in December and May, as identified on the District Calendar.

If students are requested to participate in a survey, the survey questions will be provided to parents/guardians seven days before student contact.

All out of class written essays and project must be submitted to both Google Classroom and Turnitin.com.

Late work

Classwork/assignments will be assigned on a daily basis and may be posted on Google Classroom. Usually, late work is not accepted. Any student who is absent for any reason is responsible for contacting the teacher and completing make-up work upon return to class. The student will receive the number of days absent to complete and turn in the work for credit. The teacher will be flexible with students when possible, while still maintaining the rigor and expectations of this course. Please communicate any situation that arises as soon as possible and before the due date so that the teacher can make the best decisions for your educational needs.

The late work policy listed above applies to any paperless submissions. If an assignment requires submission to turnitin.com, the late work policy will apply for all students, which allows a 24-hour grace period given with a 10% reduction in the final grade. Quarter grades

Summative (80%): tests/quizzes, essays (process and timed writes), major projects **Formative** (20%): classwork (practice/bell work), participation, etc.

ACADEMIC MISCONDUCT/ PLAGIARISM POLICY

Cheating is any form of dishonesty in an academic exercise. It includes, but is not limited to, (a) use of any unauthorized assistance in taking quizzes, tests, examinations, or any other form of assessment whether or not the items are graded; (b) dependence upon the aid of sources beyond those authorized by the faculty member (including the unauthorized use of ChatGPT and/or any other forms of artificial intelligence methods) in writing papers, preparing reports, solving problems, or carrying out other assignments; (c) the acquisition, without permission, of tests or other academic material belonging to or administered by the school or a member of the faculty or staff; and (d) fabrication of data, facts, or information.

Plagiarism is a form of cheating in which a student falsely represents another person's work as his or her own – it includes, but is not limited to: (a) the use of paraphrase or direct quotation of the published or unpublished work of another person without full and clear acknowledgment; (b) unacknowledged use of materials prepared by another person or agency engaged in the selling of term papers or other academic materials; and (c) information gathered from the internet and not properly identified.

Self-Plagiarism occurs when an author reuses her/her own previously written work or data in a 'new' written product without letting the reader/instructor know that this material has appeared elsewhere. This includes reusing any portion of an assignment previously written and/or submitted to an instructor for a grade and/or an assessment. Self-plagiarism is a form of cheating and is academically dishonest

Digital or Online Media Any student caught cheating, including digitally or via social media, (giving or receiving answers/work) will receive a zero on the assignment. These infractions are taken VERY seriously and will not be tolerated. This includes texting someone answers and other forms of digital sharing. In accordance with the Perry Student Handbook: "Copying the work of another person and submitting it as your own, obtaining unauthorized or undocumented material from the Internet or other sources, or securing teacher materials or work in a dishonest or unauthorized way are all considered cheating. Allowing another student to copy your work is considered cheating."

Using unapproved internet sources during online quizzes, assignments, and assessments are also strictly prohibited.

Units of Study and Selected Novels

Units of Study

Unit 1 - Rhetorical Analysis* Students will understand and apply the rhetorical situation by reading a full-length non-fiction text, a variety of short non-fiction texts, and writing to a variety of rhetorical analysis prompts. Students will understand and analyze the rhetorical choices of writers/speakers and will apply specific rhetorical choices to their own writing

Unit 2 - Synthesis* Students will read and analyze a variety of nonfiction texts for line of reasoning, claims and evidence, and methods of development. Students will understand and apply these concepts in timed and untimed writing situations. Furthermore, students will begin the research process by self-selecting a topic and conducting initial research.

Book: self-selected non-fiction titles

Unit 3 - Argument* Students will read and analyze a variety of nonfiction texts for line of reasoning, claims, evidence, and methods of development. Students will understand and apply these concepts in timed and untimed writing situations. Students will also develop a strong understanding of types of evidence including current events, history, pop culture, and personal experience. Lastly, students will complete the research process by composing an argumentative research-based essay.

Unit 4 - The Memoir* Students will read a self-selected memoir and a variety of shorter memoir pieces to understand the development and structure of memoir writing. Students will understand and apply these concepts to a personal college application essay.
