The Arizona Early Learning Standards have been developed to provide a framework for the planning of quality learning experiences for all children 3 to 5 years of age. The standards cover a broad range of skill development and provide a useful instructional foundation for children from diverse backgrounds and with diverse abilities.

There are eight standards that we focus on in Early Childhood Education. They are Approaches to Learning, Social-Emotional, Language and Literacy, Mathematics, Science, Social Studies, Physical Development, Health and Safety, and Fine Arts. These standards are meant to help educators and parents in preparing young children for

Learning at Home

Your home is your child's first learning environment. Develop their skills by using play, everyday items and daily household tasks.

Every month, on the back of this newsletter, you can find activities to do at home with your child that will promote developmentally appropriate skills to guide your child through their pre-k year and help them build the foundation for the skills they need to be successful in kindergarten.

All of the activities you will find on the calendar correlate to the Arizona Early Learning Standards. You will find a 1 or 2 letter code at the end of each activity identifying which standard is being addressed. The key is as follows:

AL: Approaches to Learning SE- Social-Emotional

LL- Language and Literacy

M- Mathematics

PD- Physical Development, Health and Safety

S- Science

SS- Social Studies

FA- Fine Arts

Go on a color/shape hunt in your house. Look for one color/shape at a time. (M)		Look through magazines for children doing different things, ask "What is the child doing?" (LL)		Encourage your child to "paint" with water outside on cement walls, pavement or bricks. (FA)		While at the grocery store, look at apples and compare sizes, shapes and colors. Use words like same and different. (S)
	Use stuffed animals or dolls to act out things your family likes to do together. (FA)		Find a new digital book online or in a reading app! (LL)		Give your child old envelopes to "write" letters and "mail" them by putting them in a special place. (SS)	
Read a story to your child. Ask questions about what happens in the story. (LL)		Make a height chart by measuring your child against the wall. Try again in 3 months. Talk about the change. (SE)		Give your child scissors (child size) and help him/her snip small pieces of paper. (PD)		Encourage your child to draw a picture of your family. (SS)
Sing simple counting songs and rhymes with your child. (M)	Encourage your child to "read" a book to you by using pictures to tell the story. (LL)		Give your child a mirror and ask him/her to describe his/her face. Ask "what color are your eyes" or "what shape is your nose?" (SE)		Play "Body Identification". Ask your child to point to body parts like shoulder, knees, ankle, and elbow. (PD)
