Vinyl Production Backlogs Hit Independent Artists

With lasting supply chain disruptions, demand increases, and newfound commercial potential, vinyl record production is facing new challenges. Independent artists face wait times of over a year for record production.

Larger artists like Adele, Ed Sheeran, Olivia Rodrigo, and others, as well as big-box retailers like Target, Walmart, and Amazon, have taken new-found interest in the format of vinyl, quickly consuming much of the production capacity in the United States. While popular musicians moved on to CD, and eventually streaming, independent artists relied upon vinyl sales for financial viability and kept small-scale production operations running. As large record labels and artists began to buy up space in these plants, coupled with the difficulty of establishing new pressing plants and COVID supply disruptions, smaller artists are feeling

the impacts of waiting lists.

who don't pull Adele-level Artists streaming numbers can't afford to release an album without physical copies— especially with a lack of income from tours following the last two years. Independent artist Damon Krukowski said, in his newsletter focused on independent artist's issues. "projects submitted today are being given dates in 2023... when our inventory at our distributor hits zero, so does our income from physical media." With notoriously low payouts from Spotify and other streaming platforms, selling physical copies matter most to smaller artists. So why are record labels and huge artists so concerned about pressing massive vinyl runs, which near 500,000 copies for some artists?

The financial and charting incentive for large scale record labels, which some independent artists are calling corporate greed, proliferate this issue. Krukowski continued later in the post, saying "Nine thousand LPs are nothing to Ed Sheeran. But they are a means to survival for independent artists like me." *Photo by Griffin Eckstein*





'One-to-One Initiative' to Bring Computers to All Chandler High Students

Chandler High is getting some new tech—a lot of new tech. Our school is partnering with Intel and Dell to create the "One-to-One Initiative," one computer for every student. Besides being a laptop, some of the devices will have built-in WiFi, so that students without reliable internet can have the same access as those who do. Having access to technology is known to show improvements in grades, attendance, information retention, and classroom behavior.

With the rise of the internet, more and more curriculum is online. When every student is able to have their own device, it allows for learning to take place at their own speed and for students to adapt the information into their own learning style so they perform better. Computers allow for students to take learning beyond the classroom and apply the information in a different setting.

Although it's exciting to think about getting your own laptop, it's important to remember that these devices will be tools, akin to a textbook. Students won't be in front of the screens every class every day. Every student will be trusted to be responsible and take care of a laptop. The date for distribution of these laptops is set for January 26 and 27. If all goes well, every Chandler student will have a school-issued laptop by the beginning of February. Remember that privilege these computers are а and something that will benefit many years of students to come. Be respectful, responsible, and kind to these devices when we get them; they are school computers after all.

Cargo Ships **Backed** Up in **US** Ports Shipping Delays restaurants, schools, and grocery stores. Expected to Continue Well into 2022

Many cargo ships are backlogged in US ports and are expected to remain so into next year. The crisis in supply chains was driven by the pandemic when consumer sales rose and worker shortages increased. According to Bloomberg analysis shipping data, the backlog started nearly a year ago, a few months into the pandemic.

An article from BBC states that "consumer goods demand is overall 22% higher compared with pre-pandemic levels (comparing February 2020 with August 2021)". The increase isn't surprising, but

the quick rise in demand couldn't be met by shipping services and ports, leading to blockages. The backlog is causing shortages in manv areas. including

Stores run out of some food products, restaurants miss necessities such napkins and cups, and schools have seen a loss of items such as whiteboard markers. And when these items are available, they come at a higher price, expanding burdens financial created bv the pandemic.

According to The Guardian, "the ports together move 40% of container imports in the US and 30% of exports". World counts of ships stuck in port have increased as well. Canada's Vancouver port is dealing with its highest volume of ships since tracked, similarly to Russia. A White House task force has been set up to try and ease the bottleneck. Other attempts to ease the blockage have already been made, such as keeping the LA port open longer. Nevertheless, many industry experts don't expect the blockage to end anytime soon.

The Port of Los Angeles has faced bottlenecks moving shipping containers out, causing nation-wide supply concerns. The Biden administration has begun taking action to clear the port, like extending its hours and send federal funds.



On December 24, 2008, a horrible tragedy occurred, now called the Covina Massacre. On a day that's supposed to be filled with festivities and joy, one man, Bruce Jeffrey Pardo, decided to incite the opposite. Pardo, filled with rage, vengefully went after his ex-wife and her family. His rage stemmed from his recent divorce which had just been finalized that past week.

As Pardo prepared to "light up" his ex's home, he decided to play into the festivities of the season. Pardo appeared on his ex's doorstep in a bright red and jolly Santa suit. He knocked on the door, heard the kids inside making excited squeals for Santa, and started shooting. The family ran around, screaming as they recognized him immediately. In a feeble attempt to avoid the spray of bullets, they ran and hid under the table.

Pardo then attempted to light the house on fire. He had created a device made from two fuel tanks fused together as a way to quickly consume the house in flames. He killed nine people and injured three others.

While his original plan was to escape to Illinois with a pre-purchased plane ticket, Pardo's explosive device malfunctioned, and he suffered several debilitating burns from the fire and explosions. Pardo drove to his brother's house where he then committed suicide as his final act in the desperate rampage.

You Shouldn't Die at a Concert

Picture this... In a time where a post-pandemic world is a seemingly feasible reality, you travel to Houston to attend a music festival hosted by one of the biggest recording artists in the world. The spread of COVID-19 prevented many artists from touring for almost two years. This is the first time you've been in a crowd full of people in what feels like eternity.

The opening acts? Almost perfection, but nothing can top the energy of a crowd bursting with anticipation, waiting to see THE Travis Scott.

As he enters the stage you feel the ground shake. Suddenly, a crowd previously bursting with energy is now surging. As the audience stampedes bodies, you see the flashing lights of an ambulance carry the body of the person formerly standing next to you.

What ensues for the next 90 minutes is chaos.

This set list of 25 songs resulted in over 300 injuries as well as 10 deaths and counting.

Nobody Should Die at a Concert. First-hand accounts of festival attendees

went viral on social media. Videos of people urging staff to end the concert and assist unconscious fans spread on TikTok.

Once the aftermath of this festival rose to national attention, Scott distributed a <u>video</u> <u>statement</u> across social media claiming that he attempted to help members of the audience receive assistance whenever he became aware of injuries or distress within the crowd.

Regardless of if Scott genuinely tried his best to get help for all situations that he noticed, ten of his fans died because of that night. Those people who lost their lives after spending their hard earned money and years of anticipation to see their idol were his responsibility.

Despite <u>a prior conversation with the</u> <u>Houston police chief</u> in which concerns about crowd control was shared, Scott continued to encourage discord within his audience.

A person who incites violence and chaos within their crowds is responsible for the results of that violence and chaos. Travis Scott's lengthy <u>history</u> of repeating this dangerous behavior makes it difficult to believe that he had the best interest of his audience at heart.

However, that statement raised an interesting question: How can you guarantee that a single person receives assistance for their medical emergency in a crowd of thousands?

Senior Makayla Larntz witnessed an answer to this question first-hand as she witnessed a fan next to her lose consciousness at a Harry Styles concert, that took placeeight days after the events at the Astroworld Festival: "I think the health crisis was treated properly...the audience [had] called over security as they carried her up the stairs. They came pretty quick and I think handled her with care."

tragedy brought This in Houston attention to an important issue when attending concerts- maintaining the safety of crowds. Aside from the lawsuit filed by 125 audience members that Scott is facing following the injuries at Astroworld, an extended sense of urgency regarding the safety of fans has resulted from these several unnecessary injuries and deaths. Fans of other high-profile recording

artists immediately took to social media to provide <u>examples</u> of performers intervening in situations where a member of the audience was in danger or in need of assistance at events before and after the AstroWorld Festival, including large events like Rolling Loud.

In the days following this tragedy, artists have taken the initiative to maintain the safety of their fans. One artist gave a heartfelt reminder at the beginning of his set, encouraging his audience to be considerate of fellow the fans surrounding them. These artists are receiving a much needed reality check. While you are performing, your fans are your responsibility.

The Issue with Jaywalking

During the morning announcements early in the second quarter, Chandler administrators made some statements about jaywalking. There are consequences for a student that jaywalks. Some students have expressed believing that this is unfair. But is it? Many school rules exist with the safety of students in mind. For example, students are not allowed to carry a knife because they can become a lethal weapon. Students should not share open foods because that can spread illness. Students are not allowed to jaywalk because they can get run over or cause other accidents.

Any student who has driven through a parking lot has likely seen some frustrating things, such as that one lady chatting away on her phone while taking forever to cross the road. Pedestrians do indeed have the right of way in those areas and believe that cars will always stop for them. But even when someone does have the right of way, they should still be mindful of everyone else using the road.

The mindset becomes dangerous when brought out onto non-residential roads. Jaywalking disrupts the flow of traffic and is comparable to brake checking. Drivers often have little time to react when a pedestrian shows up in the wrong place, so they might not be able to stop in time as their vehicle approaches the pedestrian. In such a situation, the unfortunate driver is usually the one who gets punished. Jaywalking has also been particularly dangerous in Arizona. Perry Vandell, a reporter for AzCentral, states "Arizona had the fourth highest pedestrian fatality rate in the country in 2018."

There is likely a safe way to jaywalk. There are safe ways to do lots of dangerous activities. Chances are, that safer way to jaywalk will take more time than it'd be worth. It would also be pretty difficult, as it's difficult to judge how fast traffic may be moving. Which means that jaywalking is generally a more dangerous or time-consuming route.

Loud Voices for the Library

The JSU, a.k.a. the Jones Student Union, is supposed to be a learning and technology hub for Chandler High School. Used as the media center, cafe, library, career center, study zone, and classroom, it sounds as if the JSU would be a fan favorite for students.

Unfortunately, that isn't the case.

Although the JSU is fairly full of people during the day, it's usually used primarily by mandatory classes being held there.

The JSU is open from 7:00 am to 3:30

pm. The school day is in session from 7:25 to 2:14. It opens 25 minutes before school starts and closes 75 minutes after. For a school of almost four thousand students, all from different backgrounds, that's not a lot of time. One hundred minutes for students to access WiFi, computers, and quiet before going home.

I collected data from students across campus and 65% of those surveyed agreed that the JSU needs to be open longer. Chandler High student Robert Williams said, "I feel it should be longer than 3:30 for after school. I run a podcast, and that used to be our recording space but there's just too little time so we switched spaces."

Students need to have the spaces for both educational and creative growth. We are all teenagers, and we spend a good chunk of our lives at school, and not all of us can go home and have the same environment. Sophomore Makena Colihan said, "The JSU really helps me a lot in school, and everyone there is always kind and respectful. I do think that it should be open longer because I don't have a computer at home and rely on the JSU for projects, and it can get annoying when I can't get everything done."

One hundred minutes for six or more classes of homework is not enough!

The school cannot expect every student to have the ability to work at home. If the JSU wants to serve as a resource for students, it needs to be open when students need it. Besides their hours, some students also said that the JSU's homework-only policy is not realistic for a school library. "I think it should change the rule of ONLY working on homework to be able to stay there. Sometimes kids need a safe place to wait for their parents and don't have anything to work on," said Kathryn Veloz, a sophomore who frequently uses the JSU after school.

School should be a place that kids can be comfortable. Kids that have siblings or chaotic households aren't always able to get home by 3:30, and if the JSU isn't open, they have nowhere to go.

Considering how much time we spend on campus, it's absurd that we aren't allowed to be there longer.

Not to mention the fact that many of the

students I interviewed didn't even know what the JSU is. Of the people I interviewed who weren't typical JSU users, 31% said they didn't use it because they didn't know what or where it was.

Alana Toigo, a sophomore student who is very engaged with our school as a lead anchor for Wolf News and a member of many other programs around campus, said, "Actually, it seems like I don't know much about what the JSU offers, so maybe there could be more promotion sharing what it provides. More advertisement and all."

If Alana, an involved member of the student body, doesn't know what the JSU is for, then how can we as a school know that the JSU is reaching out to all of the students on campus, not just the ones that already know what's happening in there?

To get input from those that work in the library, I interviewed Mr. Mosqueda, the Media Center Specialist. I asked him if the JSU's hours would ever be subject to change, and he said, "Yes! We are here for the students, so if there is enough demand, we can adjust our hours as needed. Sometimes we've stayed open until 4:00 because we had students working on important projects."

The JSU can be flexible if we need it to

be, which means positive change can occur. I asked Mr. Mosqueda if, as a teacher in the JSU, there was anything that he thinks could be improved. He said, "I always think there is room for improvement! I would love to see more students use the JSU space for clubs and collaboration. In fact, I'm also talking with the City of Chandler about hosting lunchtime events and programming in our space. Ideally, I would also love to have a 3D printer and a makerspace lab in the JSU. I have a lot of ideas to help improve the JSU, but more importantly, I'd love to hear from the students. This is the Jones STUDENT Union, and I want this place to be student-centered. I'm always happy to get feedback and ideas from the students."

Not just the students want reform in the JSU. Having the backing of a teacher who works there can help get change jump-started and get the JSU to where it needs to be. Making improvements and additions to the JSU will help spread the word about the JSU around campus and get more students in there.

As the student body here at Chandler, we should use our voice to get the things we need from our school. The JSU needs to be a place that every student at Chandler knows they can use for academic support when they need it, and it's our duty as students here to make the changes that it needs.


made 111 total kills, 29 total serving aces, and 159 digs. By the end of their season, the overall record stands at 12-19. We wish the ladies much luck for next year's season.

In the exhibit, "You will be immersed in Van Gogh's works - from his sunny landscapes and night scenes to his portraits and still life paintings. The installation includes the Mangeurs de Pommes de Terre (The Potato Eaters, 1885), the Nuit étoilée (Starry Night, 1889), Les Tournesols (Sunflowers, 1888), and La Chambre à coucher (The Bedroom, 1889),





and so much more." It is a very relaxing experience with multiple seating areas and slow music. There are some safety regulations for the exhibit:

- Face coverings required for all staff and guests
- Guests must sit in social distancing floor markings
- Temperature checked upon arrival
- No weapons of any kind
- No skateboards, bikes, or helmets

As long as you follow these rules, you will be assured of a great experience.

The Immersive Van Gogh Exhibit will be open in Phoenix until February 6th, 2021. There are multiple ticket types: VIP, premium, basic, and child (6-16). Children 5 and under do not need tickets. The higher type of ticket you pay for, the more added perks you get for a better experience. The price per ticket vary on peak, off-peak, and prime times:

• **Peak times** are generally Holiday Mondays, Wednesday – Friday after 5 PM, all day Saturday, and Sundays before 7 PM.

- Off-Peak times are generally all day Monday and Tuesday, Wednesday – Friday before 5 PM, and Sundays after 6 PM.
- **Prime times** are generally Friday at 7 PM, Saturday at 1 PM and 2 PM, and Sunday at 1 PM.

The prices are from \$29.99-\$99.99. Additional information on ticket prices can be found on the <u>Immersive Van Gogh Exhibit</u> <u>website</u>, along with information about accessibility, show info, and operations.
