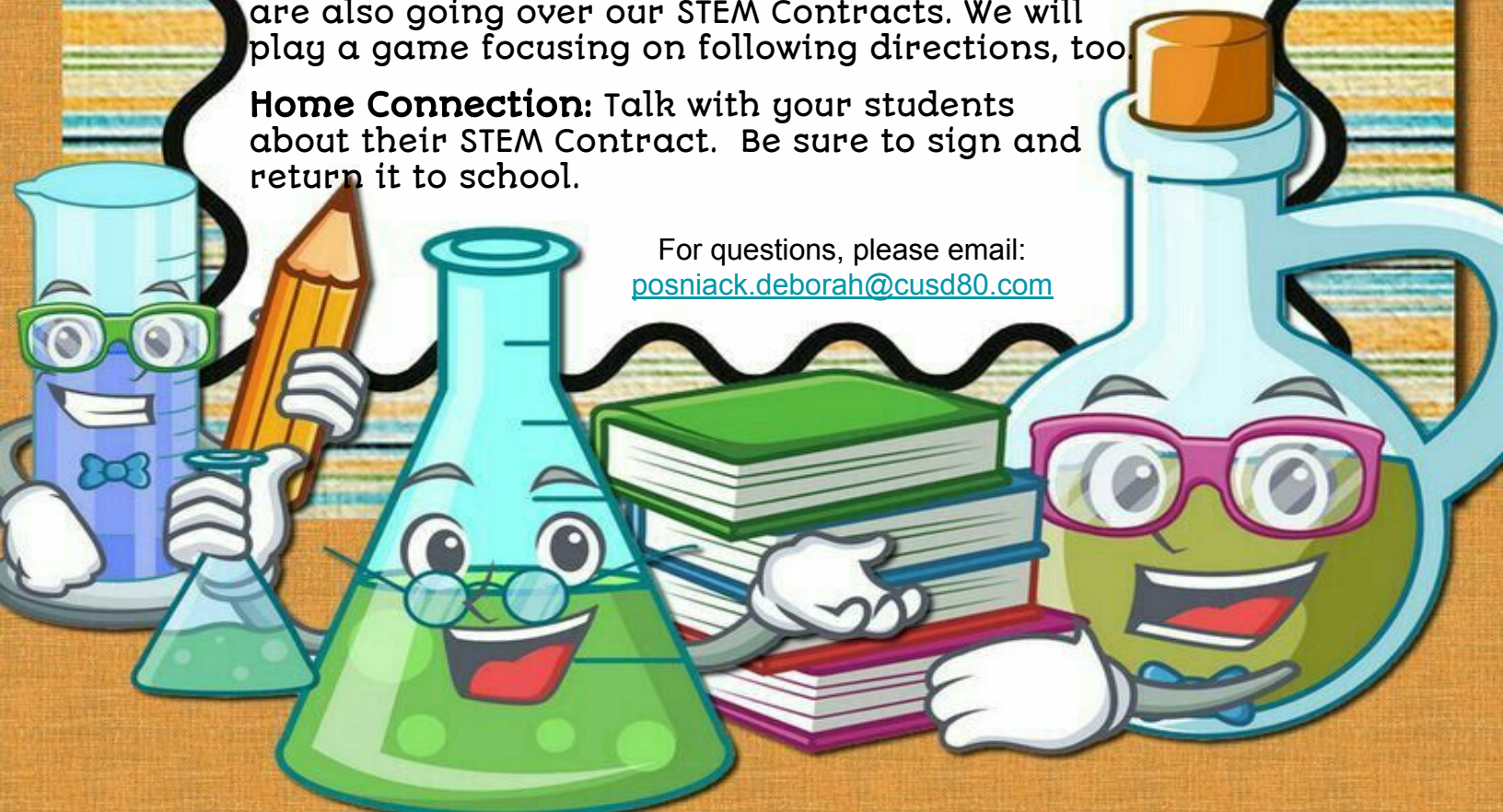
Home Connection: Ask your student what emoji they made in STEM class and have them tell you why or what their expression represented.
