

ACDEC Takes Minnesota

After taking first place in the state championship in early March, Hamilton's own Academic Decathlon team headed off to Nationals the week of April 21st. The team spent their week in Bloomington, Minnesota preparing for the intense competition. They competed in a series of challenging events against 72 teams from the U.S, UK, and China. The ten events fall under the theme of the The 1960s: A Transformational Decade, all events being equally as demanding.

Overall, the trip was a huge success, as Hamilton placed fourth in the nation in Division 1 and 7th overall including international teams and all divisions. The team also placed 3rd in Super Quiz, ousting the Illinois team from their spot.

In addition to the team's accomplishments, individual medals were also awarded to the outstanding team members on the team. This includes Jake Nance (12), who placed in a long list of events which included: Bronze overall, Gold Science, Silver Language and Literature, Silver Music and Bronze Math. Nance expressed, "given that it was our first time at nationals, I am very proud of how our team did." There is no doubt these accomplishments come after a lot of practice and commitment to long hours of studying and preparation. This dedication to the team and studying at any and all opportunities is what makes the team so impressive and successful in everything that they do!

Jasmine Sun (11) commented about how nationals was different from any other competition, saying, "the national competition did many things differently such as interviews without resumes, clickers many things differently such as interviews without resumes, clickers instead of scantrons, arena interviews, group speeches, etc. At first it was intimidating, but overall it has made me more confident in my abilities." 



Notre Dame Cathedral

Tragedy struck the heart of Paris, France this April when a devastating fire broke out beneath the roof of its beloved Notre Dame Cathedral. Onlookers stood horrified at the scene as plumes of smoke penetrated the sky and cascades of water fell over the structure while firefighters' struggled to put out the flame.

By the time it was extinguished, the building's spire and most of its roof had been destroyed, its upper walls severely damaged.

Officials are uncertain exactly what caused the fire, but it's possible the accident could have occurred during renovations - arson has been ruled out.

The infamous Notre Dame Cathedral, known largely for its historical significance and complex architecture, holds a special place in the hearts of many who took time to mourn over its burning. Although a large number of its artworks and religious relics were able to be moved to safety, many others were damaged or destroyed. This has prompted an international response from both French and American donors, who've pledged billions to the reconstruction of Notre Dame.

The New-York based French Heritage Society has launched a restoration fund for the structure; Elizabeth Stribling, the chair of the Society, said in a press release, "I fight back tears as I write this. Notre-Dame is more than a religious symbol, it speaks of human achievements and great art." This speaks alongside some of France's "superrich" donors like

Bernard Arnault and François-Henri Pinault who have each promised at least 100 million euros.

The burning of such a prominent cultural symbol is not only a heart-breaking event for France, but for the world. Americans are grieving the damage, and even fellow Huskies feel the shock. Senior student Lance Kristof says, "I felt uneasy when I first heard the news about Notre Dame. To think that all the history that has been preserved in that building can be destroyed in just a few hours. It's unnerving to be reminded of how fragile it all is." Those words resonate with many who felt the devastation hit home this April 15th.

From the ashes, however, rise precious hope and determination to preserve what's left of Notre Dame.




The series is finally winding down, and *Game of Thrones* has left a distinct impact on pop culture and society.


The Huskies Head Coach, Mike Woods, said this about how the




The girls had their first playoff game against Desert Ridge and took care of business with an easy 11-1 victory!

Boys Tennis




