

Our Safety Officer, Jennifer Hall has also been visible on our campus almost every day walking both the grounds and the insides of our campus.


To help do your part with safety at our school, please be sure to do the following:

A Few Reminders From The Health Office...

Medications:

All medications need to be brought to school by a parent/adult. No meds can be transferred via student.

- If consent for emergency inhalers/epipens are given for student to carry - the student must be able to administer it themselves in an emergency (only exception would be priority preschool in which it can be in backpack and teacher would assist)
- If consent is given for student to carry emergency medications they are responsible for bringing the medication with them on all field trips. Only Emergency medications kept in the health office are automatically sent on field trips.
- If you are needing a prescription medicine (including antibiotics only 4x a day will be accepted) to be given at school -you must have the Consent form signed by the doctor before turning in the medication and it must be in a labeled prescription bottle (it cannot be transported back and forth each day)
- Cough drops are considered medication by the district they cannot be sent with a student to school

Health Protocol:

- Fevers (100 or above), diarrhea, vomiting must stay home 24 hours after the last symptom without using medication to alleviate symptoms - there are no exceptions - they are most contagious within 24 hours of last symptom.
- Persistent cough, headache, stomach ache, sore throat, earache and toothaches if prolonged or severe enough to interrupt classroom instruction are all reasons to keep your child home.
- Rash with fever student cannot come to school. If a student has a rash/hives with no fever - please make either the teacher or health office are aware when sending to school
- Red itchy eyes that include watering, draining or crustiness please take child to health care provider to rule out conjunctivitis before bringing them to school.
- If a diagnosis of strep, conjunctivitis, etc. are received - a student MUST be on medication for 24hours minimum before returning to school.

Preschool has had a great start to the school year! We spent the first month getting to know each other and our school. This month we look forward to sharing about the people in our family



and how they are each important. We have been learning about patterns all around us and are beginning to learn about the different ways we can measure things. We had so much fun with our water investigations and can't wait to learn more about "Astonishing Air"!



FIRST GRADE—We have been busy in <u>reading</u> learning about different genres, choosing "just right" books, and working with short vowels. We continue to learn various reading strategies such as drawing conclusions, predicting, and sequencing. During <u>writing</u> we are working on identifying and writing complete

sentences. We have been working hard in using thinking maps to organize our writing. We are also working on writing letters correctly, using the correct line spacing, and ending with punctuation marks. We have worked on number sense in <u>math</u> to the number 10. We have been doing a lot of addition and subtraction, story problems and use a variety of strategies to come up with our answers. We encourage the kids to use their higher order thinking skills, explaining how they arrived at their answers. We write our conclusions in our math journals. In <u>science</u> we will explore living and non-living organisms and also do a unit on apples!

THIRD GRADE is off to an amazing start. Our students are excited about learning to write in cursive and beginning to learn our multiplication facts. Also, we now know all about the scientific method and doing lots of cool science experiments in each classroom! Third graders are studying geography in Social Studies, so you may



ying geography in Social Studies, so you may hear about the seven continents and oceans. Thank you for ordering our 3rd grade shirts. We've seen lots of students wearing them. Remember to wear them on spirit days and field trips!!!



FOURTH GRADE is off to a great start this year! Our fourth graders kicked off the school year with one of our favorite Journey's stories, "Coming Distractions". This anchor text not only allowed us to practice our targeted skills, but let us gain experience and begin the year with an exciting informational

text! In science, we've learned all about the scientific method and will soon begin conducting experiments with electricity and magnetism. Our fourth graders have been hard at work progressing in number sense skills as math becomes more challenging each day. We've had a productive start so far and we look forward to a successful year with all of our fourth grade superheroes.



Special—August has been a fun filled month with the Specials Team. Cosmic Bowling ended the month with disco balls and music as the students learned bowling skills. In band and orchestra, students have chosen their instruments and are getting started as new musicians in fifth grade. Sixth grad-

ers continue to advance with their skills. Music, Computer Lab, and library classes are also gearing up for a great year. Stop in anytime to chat with one of the teachers or see what we are doing in class! C

Kindergarten—In September, Kindergarten is digging into our Dinosaur Unit! We will read fiction and non-fiction books about dinosaurs, dig up fossils, and erupt volcanoes after learning about earth materials. In reading, we will continue to focus on two letters per work and introduce new sight



two letters per week and introduce new sight words as well. It is important to practice these sight words nightly with your child. In writing, we will continue to focus on handwriting and the proper formation of our letters. We will continue to expand our number sense with numbers 0-5 by modeling addition/subtraction, representing numbers in a variety of ways, and comparing numbers.



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SECOND GRADE—We started

the year meeting new second grade friends & learning about friendship by reading the stories "Henry and Mudge" and "Frog and Toad". Our language time was spent using Thinking Maps for our narrative writing. We also did sequencing, ABC order, and learned how to

use a glossary. Our math curriculum stretched our minds by using numbers up to 1,000!! Second graders used new vocabulary terms and became familiar with our math books. We learned about our world as we studied geography and soon move on to states of matter in science. We are working hard in 2nd grade!

FIFTH GRADE is off to a busy school year! For the past few weeks, we have been learning about decimals and number sense, geography, tools & safety and scientific method in science, and have been reading some wonderful literature studies! Our first field trip is on Sept. 20th to JA Biztown. The students have prepared by applying and completing a job application for a preferred JA Biztown job, created a resume and presented their skills in a scheduled interview. They also learned how to write checks and make deposits. The students discovered the importance of supply and demand, created advertisements and worked cooperatively with fellow employ-

> SIXTH GRADE—In reading, students will be reading several different books <u>Number the Stars</u>, <u>The Giver</u>, <u>Where the Red Fern Grows</u> and <u>Touch-</u> ing Spirit Bear. In Math, students will be

working with decimals, fractions and percent. Please remember, most nights the students have some type of math homework. In Language Arts, students will continue learning about what a strong topic sentence sounds like and how the detail sentences must flow. Science, students will be exploring the science process skills that form the foundation for scientific method. There are six basic science process skills: Observation, Communication, Classification, Measurement, Inference and Predictions. In Social Studies, students will be navigating through two lands, Ancient Egypt and Ancient Greece.
