It is imperative that every student is in attendance during their testing days and that each Riggs Roadrunner gives their best effort while taking these standardized tests.


Here are several things that you as a parent can do to help your child be successful with these tests.

- Send your child to school every day (attendance is part of the criteria the state uses to determine adequate yearly progress). Students also need to arrive to school on time as well! Teachers can't teach students who aren't in school.
- 2) See that your child gets plenty of sleep each school night. Most students need at least eight hours of sleep every night.
- *3)* See that your child eats a nutritional breakfast. Even toast and a piece of fruit will provide the brain and body energy.
- 4) Encourage your child to exercise every day. Exercise increases oxygen to the brain and helps with thinking and memory. Educational research tells us that these factors will help ensure that your child does his/her very best.

# Upcoming 6<sup>th</sup> grade students and new Kindergarten – Please Read!!!!

Upcoming 6<sup>th</sup> graders that are <u>11 years old</u> must have all of the required immunizations, Tdap and Meningococcal (Menactra), which are Arizona State requirements must be re-

ceived before the 2018-2019 school year starts. Students entering 6<sup>th</sup> grade that are already 11 years old at the start of school will not be allowed to start the school year unless an updated shot record or waiver is in the health office at the start of the 2018-2019 school year.

Students entering Kindergarten will also need to be up to date on all immunizations prior to the first day of school on July 23, 2018. So please schedule those appointments now as summer will be over before you know it. Kindergarten students will not be allowed to start the school year unless they have their updated shots and an updated shot record or waiver in the health office by 7/23/18.

If you have signed an Exemption Form for religious beliefs (PRE K) or your student is entering 6<sup>th</sup> grade, an updated WAIVER form will be required. Feel free to stop by the Riggs Health Office to update your information. Thank you!!

Preschool-We have so many fun things planned for spring in preschooll We will become beginning botanists as we explore the life cycle of plants and take a closer look at nature all around us. We are so ex-

First Grade—Third quarter is coming to an end quickly. Math this quarter involved measuring using non-standard units, telling time and two and three dimensional shapes. We will be really focusing on the properties of three dimensional shapes and fractions in March. Our 1st graders continue to amaze us

with their reading growth. Reading groups continue and the kids are working with long vowels, suffixes and their meaning, ABC order, and classifying. For social studies, we are enjoying our student experts teaching the class about various topics. In science, we look forward to learning all about the life cycle of a butterfly while watching our butterflies emerge.

## Third Grade—Wow 3rd grade is wrapping up

third quarter! They have worked so hard. Students are enjoying many math and science STEM activities in class and making huge growth using technology. Also, the students in third grade are now completing most homework online using our ATI program. This is



allowing more practice and confidence at home and school using technology. Third graders just finished publishing their first book. Those are off to the publishing company. We look forward to receiving their published books this spring. Finally, they had great success researching and learning all about their President in Social Studies. We enjoyed their mini presentations. Way to go 3rd Grade!!



Fourth Grade—This month for our fourth graders we will continue becoming experts with Informational Text and learning several new strategies/ skills in reading and math. The students will explore animals and plants through our science lessons. When we return from spring break, it'll be full-

speed ahead for AIMS science and AzMERIT. We'll be reviewing all that we've learned this year in math, reading, writing, and science. We know that the students will all do their very best and we are so proud of all they have accomplished this year!

This month we are concluding our Dr. Seuss author study. It has been so much fun digging deeper into Dr. Seuss' engaging books and bringing them to life in our Classrooms. As we head into spring break please continue reading stories each night with your Child. Additionally, have your child keep a journal of their experiences away from school. Students should begin to form their own complete sentences with correct conventions (punctuation, Capitals, spacing, and penmanship).



Second Grade—It is always an exciting time of year as we research Arctic animals! This includes looking at animal adaptations, life cycles, and polar ecosystems. Our Phoenix Zoo field trip

gives us hands-on experience as well. More time is spent reading non-fiction books. Our writing expectations continue to challenge students to write descriptive sentences, look at verb agreement, commas, adjectives, informational texts, and paragraphs. Our math includes telling time, measurement, and graphing. This busy month will be a memorable one!

## Fifth Graders are springing into

action this quarter. We have worked hard over the past three quarters to prepare for the AZ Merit and are eager to show off what we know! We will be setting testing



goals in class. Please have a conversation about these at home. A fun and exciting month is awaiting us. We will begin a solar system unit in Science, a new literature study in Reading, studying westward expansion in Social Studies, working on geometry in Math, and also working on amazing STEM activities as well.



Sixth Grade—In March, sixth graders we will continue the process of preparing for AZ Merit Testing. To help your student prepare for this year's test we will begin by helping them become familiar with the test format and

terminology. They will learn/review test-taking strategies (when to guess, when not to), to become comfortable with time restrictions, and to practice answering different types of questions. Also, Mrs. Oerter will be meeting with each student to discuss last year's results and set goals for this year's testing. Our goal for all students is that they score high and show adequate growth. \*\*\*\*\*



SPECIALS—March is Music in our Schools Month! We have a great Music Dept. with Mrs. Stewart and Mrs. Borden serving our K-4<sup>th</sup> grade students.
