PORTRAIT OF A LEARNER

At the foundation of CUSD is our Portrait of a Learner. With input from more than 100 stakeholders, CUSD identified six attributes that our students will build and grow as they move through our schools and district. PARTNERSHIPS

CUSD is a recognized community partner, spanning 80 square miles and proudly earning the Chandler Chamber of Commerce Chandler 100 award. Notable collaborations include partnerships with the City of Chandler, towns of Gilbert and Queen Creek, and a groundbreaking initiative with Arizona State University and ASU Prep Digital. The K-12 Innovation Alliance honored CUSD with the Innovative District Award for this forward-thinking collaboration. The Superintendent Business Advisory Committee strengthens ties with the local business community, while a workforce development coordinator ensures students are prepared for the professional landscape. Additionally, CUSD's commitment to innovation led to recognition as a zSpace STEM District of Distinction, showcasing its successful use of augmented and virtual reality technology in elementary schools.



FINANCIAL REPORT

Chandler Unified School District's financial health is a result of strategic planning and resource alignment with our goals. By aligning our finances with the district's strategic plan, CUSD operates efficiently and effectively with a \$741.8 million budget. Notably, about 75% of the district's operational spending from Maintenance and Operations, Unrestricted Capital, and Classroom Site Fund is directly dedicated to instruction and instructional support for our students. CUSD is the 2nd largest school district in Arizona and is the 2nd largest employer in Chandler. The district is committed to our community and actively reinvests resources in maintaining schools, technology and supporting people.

STUDENTS/STAFF

In 2023, CUSD students, staff and schools achieved a remarkable total of **710 state or national academic awards**. Noteworthy accomplishments include producing **53 National Merit Finalists** (2022-2023), as well as **69 National Merit Semifinalists** (2023-2024). Additionally, 306 students earned **diploma seals**, while 43 were recognized as **National Hispanic Scholars**, and another 48 as **Capstone Scholars**.

Four educators were recognized with the **Milestone Award** by the United Chinese Association of Arizona and the Chinese Language Teacher Association, while ten teachers from CUSD received a **\$2,500 grant** from the Fiesta Bowl "Wishes for Teachers" program.



Chandler High Spanish Teacher **Sarah Wyffels** was selected as the **School Connect Summit ambassador** in 2023.

The **Chandler Chamber of Commerce** presented the 2023 **Administrator of the Year** award to **Dr. Craig Gilbert**, Associate Superintendent of PreK-12 Educational Services. Recognized alongside him were **Nina Hardin**, the school receptionist at Hamilton High, who received the Support Staff of the Year award, and **Jennifer Kraemer** from Rice Elementary, honored with the **2023 Educator of the Year award**.





2023 was a standout year for CUSD Athletics, with all CUSD High Schools securing team state championships or runner-up accolades. Throughout the year, CUSD teams and individuals garnered recognition on more than 85 occasions, including a national recognition of Hamilton golf, multiple Gatorade Players of the Year and accolades from the Arizona Interscholastic Association, affirming our status as the best in the state.



CUSD LEADERSHIP

SUPERINTENDENT

Franklin R. Narducci is CUSD's seventh Superintendent. Mr. Narducci has served as a principal and director in CUSD for 25 years, the last nine years serving as the Assistant Superintendent for Elementary Education. Under his leadership, CUSD's Community Education Department was formed, and schools have received State and National recognitions such as: The National Blue-Ribbon Award; America's Best; and Arizona A+ Schools of Excellence.

Frank is well known for his work in the field of education. He has taught educational leadership and theory courses as an adjunct staff member for Northern Arizona University and is an advocate for Early Childhood Education, having served on the East Maricopa County First Things First Council.



Frank has received numerous recognitions including National Distinguished Principal, Chandler Chamber Administrator of the Year, and was featured in the June 2018 Chandler Lifestyle Magazine as one of the Amazing Men of Chandler. He also received the Si Se Puede Foundation's Cesar E. GOVERNING BOARD

Our district relies on the vision and stability provided by our governing board. The Chandler Unified School Governing Board, like many elected bodies, contains many diverse opinions and ideas. Individual board members retain their First Amendment rights to free speech; however, personal comments do not represent the official position of the district. Governing board members are elected by the public, serving four-year terms. The board sets all district policies and has final authority over all district business. The public is welcome at governing board business meetings, usually held on the second and fourth Wednesdays of each month (7 p.m.). Study sessions are held as needed.
