Coach Shannon has been the head girls volleyball coach at ACP for four years, and has helped in building the culture of the team. He is also a Spanish teacher here at ACP which allows him to connect with students outside the court. When talking with him after the game he gave some fascinating insight into how he viewed the game. When asked how it felt to be a part of the first ever Play Like A Girl game he explained, "It was cool to see everybody get on board and come out to watch and celebrate and cheer and support female athletes. For me, I'm a big component in making sure everyone gets opportunities, especially the female athletes and the fact that everyone came out and recognized that today was really awesome". He then went on the explain how he and his coaching staff helped prepare their athletes for such a big game. He described one of the most important things they continually focus on when preparing for games, which is putting a bubble around the court and focusing on doing what to do as a team. "We focus on trying to play the game we know how to play, staying within ourselves, and just playing ACP volleyball." When specifically asked about how he keeps his athletes focused during games he explained that they focus a lot on building connections between the coaches and players, and the players themselves by focusing on, "making physical contact with teammates to stay connected and focused on the game." Finally, he wanted to express his utmost gratitude to everybody that took time out of their day to come and support his athletes.

When talking with some of the varsity athletes that were participating in the game, senior middle blocker and right side hitter, Rea-anna Fuller and freshman outside hitter, Aly Arce, they both commented on how thrilling it was to be a part of such a huge event. They also expressed their gratitude for having the support of the entire school, with Aly commenting on how the energy from the crowd helped keep up their energy in the game.
