## Chapter 6.1 Grammar Review

### The Partitive

1. The partitive is used to express *a part of a whole* and uses “de” plus the definite article.  
Ex: Je veux **le** gâteau (I want *the* cake) vs. Je veux **du** (*de+le*) gateau (I want *some* cake)

2. The followings shows contractions made with “de” to form the partitive:

MASCULINE SINGULAR	FEMININE SINGULAR	SINGULAR W/ VOWEL SOUND	PLURAL
du	de la	de l'	des

3. **IMPORTANT:** Where we often omit the partitive in English, it **MUST** be present in French.  
Ex: Je prends **des** toasts avec **du** beurre → I'm having toast with butter (**some** toast & butter).
4. **IMPORTANT:** To say you want a whole item, use the indefinite articles: “un”, “une”, and “des”.  
Ex: Je veux **un** gâteau (*the whole thing*) vs. Je veux **du** gateau (*a part of it*)

### -IR Verbs

1. To conjugate an –IR verb, drop the –IR to get the “Verb Stem.”  
Ex: *choisir* → -ir → *chois* (the “Verb Stem”)
2. Below is a sample conjugation of the –IR verb *FINIR* with the appropriate **Verb Endings**:

FINIR			
SINGULAR		PLURAL	
je	<u>finis</u>	nous	<u>finissons</u>
tu	<u>finis</u>	vous	<u>finissez</u>
il / elle / on	<u>finit</u>	ils / elles	<u>finissent</u>

### The Verb “Vouloir”

1. “Vouloir” is an irregular boot verb. It must be memorized. It means to want. Notice the stem changes between “veu” and “vou” The conjugation is below:

VOULOIR			
je	<u>veux</u>	nous	<u>voulons</u>
tu	<u>veux</u>	vous	<u>voulez</u>
il / elle / on	<u>veut</u>	ils / elles	<u>veulent</u>
