Cross Country by: Taylor S.

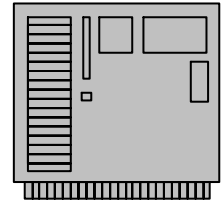

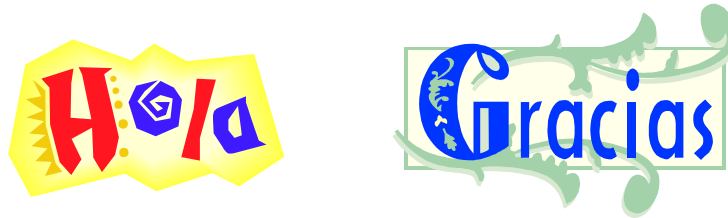
- Q:** How long have you been teaching here at Bogle?

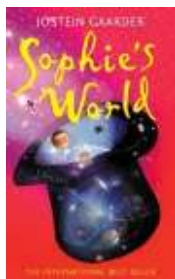
Spelling Bee! By: Rahul R.

What are we doing in class? Language Arts: Lisa Z. and Iris C.

This quarter, the CSI's continued working to improve each detective's grammar and vocabulary skills. 7th grade classes read The Year of Impossible Goodbyes by Sook Nyui Choi while taking notes in their dialectical journals. The 8th graders chose their own literary novel to read from a compiled list of enjoyable books, which were: And Then There Were None by Agatha Christie, White Fang by Jack London, The Diary of a Young Girl by Anne Frank, Sophie's World by Jostein Gaarder, and Treasure Island by Robert Louis Stevenson. Higher order thinking skills are very important when analyzing a story.

Besides novels, 8th graders have been working on poetry and poetic terms. The 8th graders have read various poetic examples of sonnets, lyrics, and ballads to name a few. Seventh graders were busy with expository text along with research papers that covered diverse topics such as UHI, football, and famous scientists. While writing a persuasive essay about their views on topics such as gun control and animal testing, propaganda was used—just as it was used throughout the 7th graders' ads about creative inventions. Our students continue to strive in language arts!



What are we doing in class? Social Studies: Iris C.

Even with Mrs. Enright being absent for the last couple of days, our CSI Agents have been doing a fabulous job keeping up with Social Studies. Over the quarter, the 8th graders have covered the entire American Revolution—from watching clips from John Adams to reading from the text book. Aside from American History, they have been learning economics and civics. In economics, opportunity cost, scarcity, and trade-off are just three of the various terms that the eighth graders have learned. In Civics, they have just covered our Constitution, and they are wrapping up the quarter with current event power points.

Our seventh graders, on the other hand, have been learning about Reconstruction, Jim Crow Laws, slavery, scarcity, opportunity cost, the Frontier, boomtowns, Native Americans, assimilation, maps, factors of production, cost-benefit analysis, Industrial Age and that is just A FEW! Both our seventh and eighth graders are having an amazing time learning about history!

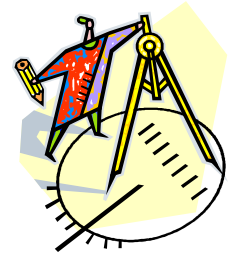


What are we doing in class? Math: Iris C.

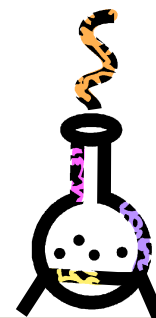
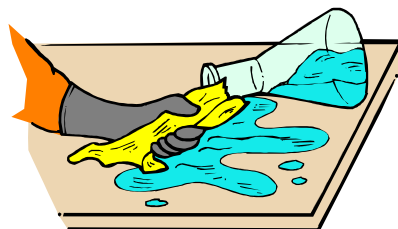
With a little thought, a simple math class can turn into a crazy area of fun!

 They bite everything that goes near

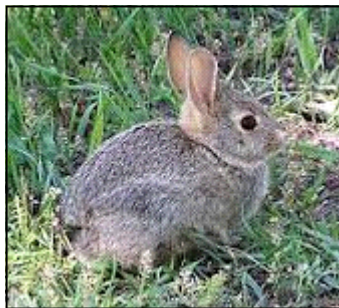
When it's time to play

craving win,

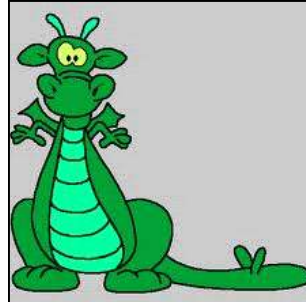
As he put a bunch of junk food from town on his
