COURSE OVERVIEW:

We the peopleare going Constitutional. This course will examine the fundamentals of government on national, state and local levels. This includes the three branches of government, rights & responsibilities of American citizenship, and the role of political parties in our system. Also, we will examine the U.S. Constitution, Constitutional Amendments, U.S. Supreme Court cases and the U.S. legal system. In addition, this course prepares students for the academic rigors of higher education and the working world. Students will need an open mind, respect for themselves, classmates, the instructor, and their surroundings. This class will be quite beneficial in understanding of how our country works. Students who gain the most are the ones who put forth the maximum effort to see how what we learn applies directly to their own lives.

Throughout the semester, we will conduct class using a variety of methods: lecture/discussion, simulations, cooperative learning activities and independent research. Students need to become familiar with current events through the use of online and cable broadcasts news outlets. A variety of news video clips will be shown throughout the course. Students are expected to follow the daily news and will submit formal current events assignments every week. Students will also have notebook checks every 2-4 weeks.

The course meets all Arizona State Standards for a high school government course and fulfills the graduation requirements of the Chandler Unified School District. All information contained in this syllabus is subject to change at the instructor's discretion.

MAJOR ASSIGNMENTS & ACTIVITIES:

- 1. Students will be assessed through the use of class assignments, KBATS, quizzes, unit tests, discussions, activities, and projects.
- 2. Length of assignments will vary daily, but students should expect some type of homework on a regular basis.

STUDENT EXPECTATIONS:

- 1. Show up to class <u>on-time and prepared</u> each day. This means all homework is done, assignments are read, and the proper materials brought to class.
- 2. Engage in class discussions, which are meant to stimulate ideas, foster intellectual growth and provide confidence to all students involved. No shutting down.
- 3. Turn off your phone and put it in your backpack upon entering class. There will be occasions to use them for learning only. I'll let you know when.
- 4. Required supplies. Loose-leaf paper, pencils, ballpoint pen (blue or black ink).
- 5. All assignments will be typed **or** completed in BLUE or BLACK ink only. Pencil and/or colored ink will not be accepted. All Current Events and projects must be typed.
- 6. For a restroom break, you will need to sign out, but not during instruction, presentations or activities; only during seatwork.
- 7. <u>Every</u> rule in the Perry handbook regarding plagiarism, cheating, food, hats, dress code, language, and conduct is enforced in this class.

CONTROVERSIAL TOPICS:

All government systems are laden with the righteous & the unrighteous; the mundane & the tantalizing; persecutions & liberties; politics & religion. The content of this class deals with current real-world, controversial issues. It is vital that everyone is respectful of each other's opinions, backgrounds, beliefs

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and world views. There will be a lot of agreement and disagreement on topics. Listening is essential to communicating. <u>Everyone</u> is to be valued and respected.

GRADING SCALE, ATTENDANCE & MAKE-UP WORK:

Consistent attendance if vital for success. Your semester grade consists of class assignments, projects, homework, quizzes, and tests. Per the Social Studies Dept policy grades are quantified and scaled:

Excused absences. You will have the same amount of days as your absence to complete assignments. If you are absent from a quiz or unit test, you are responsible for making it up within one week of the assessment or it will be recorded as a zero. It is 100% your responsibility to check the website and/or ask Dr. O or your classmates what you missed.

Late policy. Assignments submitted 1-day late, can earn 70%. After that, it zeros out in the gradebook. If you are absent from a quiz or test, you are responsible for arranging a make-up within one week of the assessment. If not, it will zero out in the gradebook.

Field trips and sports. Plan around them. I know your coaches, and I know you know your game schedules. Field trips are also planned weeks in advance.

Life gets difficult. Please tell me in advance when you cannot get computer access at home, are struggling in classes, incur health problems, or become overly stressed out. We will find solutions before things get unmanageable. There's a difference between excuses and legitimate difficulties. I'm on your side.

STUDENT BEHAVIOR EXPECTATIONS

The purpose of a school is to provide <u>all</u> students with an opportunity to learn in a <u>safe and orderly</u> <u>environment</u>. This environment is established by providing students with clear explanations of expected behavior. The following are the expectations for students enrolled in American Government at Perry High School.
