What is Title I?

 Title I is a PreK-6 program that provides additional academic support and learning opportunities for students at schools with high percentages of underserved children. The program is intended to help ensure that all students meet state academic standards.



Title I Goals

- Increase academic achievement
- Provide direct instructional student support
 - Intervention programs include: LLI, Lexia, Accelerated Math, Math Fluency
 - Assessment programs include: STAR Math, ATI-Galileo
- Provide professional development for school staff, which includes teachers, paraprofessionals and parent liaisons
- Promote parent education & family involvement

How are Title I Funds Spent?

- The Federal Government provides Title I funds.
- Funds are allocated on basis of number of students eligible for free/reduced lunch.
- Any expenditure must address Title 1 Plan Goals to raise student achievement.
- Title I funds must also be used for family involvement, family resource centers, materials and Parent Liaisons.

Galveston Elementary

- School-wide Title Program (93% Free and Reduced lunch rate) 2015-2016 school year
- Galveston receives extra funding to provide additional services to children that demonstrate academic and social needs
- All teachers and Title I Paraprofessionals at Galveston are Highly Qualified
- 2013 Awarded AZLEARNS "B" School; 2014 Awarded AZLEARNS "B" School. Evidence of high expectations and quality programs on our campus
- PLC Collaborative school- We work together to meet needs of students

What are my Parental Rights?

- Request meetings and parent education classes
- Review school achievement data. Parents will be provided with the results for their student. School results will be shared at monthly parent meetings as follows:
 - DIBELS Benchmark data, 3 times/year (August, January, May)
 - AZ MERIT (November)
 - MOWR information letters provided at Parent/Teacher Conferences (August)
- Review and modify Title I Parent Involvement Policy
- Review and modify Title I Parent Compact
- Request information regarding the professional qualifications of your child's teacher

What is the Parent Involvement Policy?
