Entering our Second year of Targeted Title I Assistance

Why Title I? What are our challenges?

- Over 64% of our students qualify for free-and-reduced lunch (a measure of socio-economics)
- Many of our students arrive in 7th grade with significant achievement deficiencies – for multiple reasons
- Closing gaps, with a specific focus on reading and mathematics
- Many students have a "fixed" mindset
- Perceptions

What is Targeted Title I?

- Identification of a specific population of students who will receive "targeted" intervention
 - This is typically the bottom quartile in reading and mathematics as measured by multiple assessments and evaluations
 - Star Math Testing
 - ► AIMS
 - ► Lexile Levels (SRI)
 - ► Lexia
 - ► Eventually AzMERIT

How does Title I benefit Willis?

Additional staffing:

- Parent Liaison
- Mathematics Interventionists
- Behavioral Specialist
- Intervention Programs targeted to address specific needs of individual students
 - Read 180 (in school)
 - Math 360 (in school)
 - Academic Perseverance (AP)
 - Power Hour

Willis: Past, Present, and Future

Past:

- Student population is nearly the same as it is now -- high poverty and free and reduced lunch rate
- Limited intervention programs that were focused and intentional

Present:

- o Title I
- Power Hour, Math 360, Read 180, and Academic Perseverance Period
- Technology Literate
- Building confidence with our students

Future (not too far away):

- Fast, focused, and deliberate intervention (or acceleration) for ALL students
- Dramatically reduced achievement gap
- Students who have a growth mindset

Academic Perseverance (AP)

Goal is to provide various levels of support and enrichment within the school day.

- Monday- Thursday, 40 minute period, 4th hour
- Students placed in Math, Reading, and Study Skills, based on achievement data
- Math & Reading Skills utilize diagnostic computer programs Waggle & Lexia on Day 1 and small group instruction on Day 2
 - Focus on filling gaps and helping students reach grade level mastery
- Study Skills utilizes Executive Function curriculum and focuses on helping student develop: organizational skills, goal-planning, inhibition control, and meaningful note-taking
 - Students will also participate in 20 minutes of reading

Parent Partnerships

Unmeasurable Success:

Student: "Can I come to Power Hour next year?"
Ms. Stewart: "Yes, of course."
Student: "Will you sign me up right now?"

Student: "I can breathe in Power Hour."

Math 360 (~65 Total Students)

6 students <u>reached Grade Level</u> and were exited during the school year!

11 students grew <u>more than 2 grade levels</u>. (One student grew 5 grade levels)

21 students grew at least 1 grade level.

22 students grew half to 1 year's grade level.

<u>5 students' data decreased (4 were SPED)</u>
